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in this book robert pinsky writes about contemporary poetry as it reflects its modernist and romantic past he isolates certain persistent ideas about poetry s situation relative to life and focuses on the conflict the poet faces between the nature of words and poetic forms on one side and the nature of experience on the other the author ranges for his often surprising examples from keats to the great modernists such as stevens and williams to the contents of recent magazines he considers work by ammon s ashbery bogan ginsberg lowell merwin o hara and younger writers offering judgments and enthusiasms from a viewpoint that is consistent but unstereotyped like his poetry robert pinsky s criticism joins the traditional and the innovative in ways that are thoughtful and unmistakably his own his book is a bold essay on the contemporary situation in poetry on the dazzling achievements of modernism and on the nature or situation of poetry itself

poetry can be for individual pleasure just like any art form can be following the individual heart and the artist s whims and fancies and then the world is free to accept or reject it even in that there is something of society that the artist creates no work of art exists in a vacuum the common lament is that there are not enough poets and too many politicians but it is equally true that there are poets lurking in every hidden corner of a home waiting to be discovered we aren t a dead poet s society not yet that itself should give any country or culture hope this is what essentially made us at cocoa butter come up with

positioned within current ecocritical scholarship this volume is the first book length study of the representations of plants in contemporary american english and australian poetry through readings of botanically minded writers including les murray louise glück and alice oswald it addresses the relationship between language and the subjectivity agency sentience consciousness and intelligence of vegetal life scientific philosophical and literary frameworks enable the author to develop an interdisciplinary approach to examining the role of plants in poetry drawing from recent plant science and contributing to the exciting new field of critical plant studies the author develops a methodology he calls botanical criticism that aims to redress the lack of emphasis on plant life in studies of poetry as a subset of ecocriticism botanical criticism investigates how poets engage with plants literally and figuratively materially and symbolically in their works key themes covered in this volume include plants as invasives and weeds in human settings as sources of physical and spiritual nourishment as signifiers of region home and identity as objects of aesthetics and objectivism and crucially as beings with their own perspectives voices and modes of dialogue ryan demonstrates that poetic imagination is as essential as scientific rationality to elucidating and appreciating the mysteries of plant being this book will appeal to a multidisciplinary readership in the fields of ecocriticism ecopoetry environmental humanities and ecocultural studies and will be of interest to researchers in the emerging area of critical plant studies

writer lyricist and lifelong poet d sorbet presents her third volume of touching poetry and contemporary prose this book of poetry is a journey of observations in no particular order the general theme being life and it s complexities i write from the heart thus don t heavily edit my poems intending for them to be read how they originally tumbled onto the paper from my soul

this book examines the representation of empathy in contemporary poetry after crisis specifically poetry after the holocaust the september 11 2001 terrorist attacks and hurricane katrina the text argues that recognizing both the possibilities and dangers of empathy the poems under consideration variously invite and refuse empathy thus displaying what anna veprinska terms empathetic dissonance veprinska proposes that empathetic dissonance reflects the texts struggle with the question of the value and possibility of empathy in the face of the crises to which these texts respond examining poems from charlotte delbo dionne brand niyi osundare charles reznikoff robert fitterman wisława szymborska cynthia hogue claudia rankine paul celan dan pagis lucille clifton and katie ford among others veprinska considers empathetic dissonance through language witnessing and theology merging comparative close readings with interdisciplinary theory from philosophy psychology cultural theory history and literary theory and trauma studies this book juxtaposes a genocide a terrorist act and a natural disaster amplified by racial politics and human disregard in order to consider what happens to empathy in poetry after events at the limits of empathy

in this capacious and energetic volume ira sadoff argues that poets live and write within history our artistic values always reflecting attitudes about both literary history and culture at large history matters does not return to the culture war that reduced complex arguments about human nature creativity identity and interplay between individual and collective identity to slogans rather sadoff peels back layers of clutter to reveal the important questions at the heart of any complex and fruitful discussion about the connections between culture and literature much of our most adventurous writing has occurred at history's margins simultaneously making use of and resisting tradition by tracking key contemporary poets including john ashbery olena kaltyiak davis louise glück czeslaw milosz frank o'hara and c k williams as well as musing on jazz and other creative enterprises sadoff investigates the lively poetic art of those who have grappled with late twentieth century attitudes about history subjectivity contingency flux and modernity in plainspoken writing he probes the question of the poet's capacity to illuminate and universalize truth along the way we are called to consider how and why art moves and transforms human beings

questions of possibility examines the particular forms that contemporary american poets favor and those they neglect the poet's choices reveal both their ambitions and their limitations the new possibilities they discover and the traditions they find unimaginable by means of close attention to the sestina ghazal love sonnet ballad and heroic couplet this study advances a new understanding of contemporary american poetry rather than pitting closed verse against open and traditional poetry against experimental questions of possibility explores how poets associated with different movements inspire and inform each other's work discussing a range of authors from charles bernstein derek walcott and marilyn hacker to agha shahid ali david caplan treats these poets as contemporaries who share the language not as partisans assigned to rival camps the most interesting contemporary poetry crosses the boundaries that literary criticism draws synthesizing diverse influences and establishing surprising affinities in a series of lively readings caplan charts the diverse characteristics and accomplishments of modern poetry from the gay and lesbian love sonnet to the currently popular sestina

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
